In Case You Missed It

The interview is a critical step in the recruitment process throughout a physician's training and professional trajectory. Yet we know that implicit and explicit bias in that process is a long-standing problem that unfairly disadvantages Black applicants and hinders advancement for well qualified candidates as well as the medical community's ability to increase racial and ethnic diversity in medicine.

The authors of the recent article, "Interviewed While Black," in the New England Journal of Medicine will speak about the issue, their own interview experiences, and how the medical community might address this problem.
